Artist in Residence

Rosina Possingham

Rosina Possingham, a multidisciplinary artist based in Adelaide, has recently completed an art residency centred around The Mannequin Project, a significant installation commemorating the 150th anniversary of Loreto schools in Australia in 2025. Throughout the residency, Possingham worked closely with Year 11 visual art students, introducing them to her practice, which fuses traditional techniques with contemporary digital technologies. The project is designed to reflect on both the rich history and future aspirations of Loreto education.

A crucial component of the project involved students analysing archival photographs to create a large-scale artwork that captures the unique context of Loreto Marryatville. Possingham's expertise in cyanotype printing, a 19th-century photographic process, offered an innovative approach for incorporating historical elements into contemporary art. This nontoxic technique, and distinctive deep Prussian blue aesthetic, provided students with opportunities for creative experimentation and reinterpretation of archival images.

Collaborating with a professional artist on a major project presented unique challenges for the students while delivering substantial educational benefits. It offered valuable insights into professional practice, introduced new processes, and encouraged students to express themselves creatively, ultimately building confidence in their artistic skills.

Possingham's collaborative practice made her an exemplary mentor for the students during this project, guiding them through the creative process and assisting them in overcoming challenges. The outcome of this residency will be displayed in July 2025 as part of a traveling exhibition featuring works from all Loreto schools in Australia, celebrating 150 years of Loreto education. The exhibition will provide a rewarding and motivating experience for the students, as they will see their contributions recognised in a professional context.



Lynn Lobo

Lynn Lobo is a painter living on the Fleurieu Peninsula, S.A. Originally from Pakistan, she is of Goan heritage. Her education and working life spans the fields of Visual Art, Traditional Chinese Medicine and Psychology.

Lynn paints to express her inner life through the genres of still life and landscape painting. Oil paint and gouache are her preferred mediums.

She weaves together her dreams, body sensations, close observation and memory, to give expression to what she can almost perceive, following the mystery within her subject, and herself. Painting is a process of revelation.

Lynn reflects that "while my paintings appear representational, I feel that my subject matter finds me through mutual attraction. A moment of light, a weather condition, colour combinations, the shape of one object next to another, or even the space between things is what hooks me.

These abstract, sensory experiences percolate in my body and play in my dreams. I am painting from my inside out."


Lynn has had several solo exhibitions and runs creative meditation workshops on the Fleurieu Peninsula. This year she was invited to be a Nature Studio facilitator by Country Arts SA.

She has undertaken artist residencies in Italy, Portugal, Finland and recently at Sauerbier House, Port Noarlunga.

Emerging Artist

Mia Behrens

My practice explores experiences of body and femininity through depictions of personal narratives. My experience within the male gaze has enforced the mentality that my value as a woman is driven by my bodily usefulness.

I paint chairs, valued only on their aesthetic quality, to personally symbolise this objectification. The sole intended use of the chair is to support our bodies. Thus I suspend its usefulness by withholding human interaction, to represent the way the male gaze determines feminine utility through bodily use.

I paint myself, exposed, to portray my forced vulnerability to the male gaze in accordance with this objectification, and subtly protest it by denying a seductive view. By refusing view of vulnerable bodily places and enhancing socially unacceptable female beauty traits, such as broad shoulders, blemishes, strength, and self-confidence, I interrupt society's habitual feminine eroticism and refuse the expectation to submit to it.

Through this series, I explore my experience of objectification and feeling used through a lens of healing, and expand on simply commenting on the male gaze. Methods of collection, self-protection and eraser are steps toward distorting this ingrained mentally. I refuse to be the object the male gaze wants me to be.

Opening Night Speaker Jade Torres

Alyawarre/Anmatyerre woman Jade Torres, founded Pwerle Gallery in 2015, inspired by her father Fred Torres' enterprise DACOU. Together, their mission was to unveil the distinctive artwork from their community, Atnwengerrp, to the world.

Through the powerful medium of art and visual storytelling, Pwerle Gallery emerged as a platform to showcase profound stories deeply rooted in the Atnwengerrp landscape.

Employing her skin name, Jade Akamarre facilitated her transition into a full-time artist, as she absorbed the essence of storytelling through painting. "I grew up surrounded by my family, four generations of painters, it was second nature for me." Jade carries a profound love for art, deeply ingrained in her family's legacy.

With a grandmother and greatgrandmother, both recognised Australian Aboriginal artists the late Barbara Weir and the late Minnie Pwerle, respectively, Jade naturally followed in their footsteps.

Jade's artistry is a testament to her profound connection to her culture and homeland -Atnwengerrp. Her paintings reflect her passion for the land, a deep understanding of its natural patterns, and a spiritual affinity to her ancestors.

Using a distinctive technique of loosely executed dots in linear patterns, her artworks evoke an aerial view of her country's beauty. Paying homage to her family and the generations preceding her, Jade has become a driving force in promoting Aboriginal art and culture.



In 2018, she earned a place among Vogue Australia's Game Changers, standing alongside notable figures like Emma Watson and Margot Robbie. Jade understands the importance of preserving and celebrating cultural heritage. Her commitment has gained recognition, making her a finalist in InDaily's '40 under 40' awards in 2021.

Beyond her creative pursuits, Jade has made significant contributions to her community and state. Her recent appointment as a board member of Brand SA is a testament to her unwavering dedication to promoting culture and art on a global scale. As the director of Pwerle Aboriginal Art Gallery, she consistently contributes to her community by championing Aboriginal art and culture, solidifying her as an invaluable addition to the Australian art scene.

Heather Little


